What is English about?

English is the study, use, and enjoyment of the English language communicated orally, visually, and in writing, for a range of purposes and audiences, and in a variety of forms. It is creative and critical, receptive and productive. In Aotearoa New Zealand, the study of English incorporates mātauranga Māori and considers our place in the Pacific. The more we can critically consider the messages we receive and create, the more understanding we can develop about the wider world.

Your course is planned to meet the requirements of the national English curriculum and provides you with many opportunities to achieve success in the national qualification, the National Certificate of Educational Achievement, NCEA, at Level 1.

Authenticity

You will be asked to sign a declaration at the beginning of the year that all work completed for assessment for qualification is your own. If evidence of plagiarism is found in an assessment, the grade of "Not Achieved" will be presented.

Authenticity means that you will:

- Meet the check-points for feedback to show evidence of your learning
- Produce your best work independently and have a trail of evidence to show the development of the work
- Provide oral clarification to show the depth of your understanding.
- Integrate, acknowledge, and footnote your research appropriately.
- Use AI with integrity by disclosing when, where, and how you have used AI. AI use should be consistent with the AI Acceptable Use Policy.

Authenticity means that the teacher will:

- Monitor your progress by checking drafts, version histories, give feedback, conferencing, use graphic organisers, and arrange check points.
- Communicate the authenticity expectations for each assignment task.
- Seek oral clarification

Appeal Procedure

You are entitled to appeal against internal (school) decisions about assessment results. Information is provided for you about the appeals procedure in the student handbook and online. If, following an explanation and discussion with your teacher, you do not agree with the result, you are entitled to appeal it. Be aware of the time limits for appeals (This will be within a period of three school days of receiving the decision)

The appeal application must be lodged with the Subject Teacher on the correct form, Application to Appeal an Assessment Result which is available online on our intranet.

The Award of Year 11 subject prizes at the end of year Prize Giving.

Top subject awards are based on the whole year's academic performance in the subject. The subject co-ordinators use their professional judgment to select award winners based on the following criteria:

- The proportion of Excellence grades in **Achievement Standards**.
- Completion of a standard at the first attempt, as well as the comparative quality and quantity of a student's class work.
- Demonstrating the values of an engaged and curious learner.
- Completion of all compulsory standards offered in the course to a high standard.
- Consistent effort made in classwork, attitude, and homework throughout the year.
